Sam Kane - Composer



Sam Kane is a violinist and composer from County Armagh, Northern Ireland. He recently graduated Masters with distinction from the Royal Northern College of Music (RNCM), where he studied violin with Cecily Ward, supported by the Irish Heritage Homan Potterton Bursary for Strings and Help Musicians Postgraduate Awards.

Sam was recently awarded the BBC Northern Ireland Young Artist's Platform award and performed as Soloist with the Ulster Orchestra in 2025, as well as having one of his compositions performed by the orchestra in 2026.

Sam was awarded the Liverpool Philharmonic's Rushworth Composition Prize in 2023, composing for their Ensemble 10:10, as well as the Hard Rain Soloist Ensemble, who selected him as a Featured Young Artist for their 2023/24 Season. Sam has performed his own music at venues such as Wigmore Hall, Leighton House, and St James' Palace, London, and has been broadcast on Classic FM. He also had the opportunity to receive lessons from Caroline Shaw at the Stauffer Centre for Strings, Cremona.

Miriam Bean - Artist

Miriam is a multidisciplinary artist working across animation, sound, design and printmaking. For this project, she explored rhythm, abstraction and storytelling using a combination of hand-drawn and design techniques.

Her approach often plays with the interaction between old and new technologies, leaving space for chance and unpredictability in the process.

NOMAD is an award-winning flexible ensemble founded in 2021 by classically trained musicians Ailsa Burns, Iona Kaye, and Elena Orsi. They create multidisciplinary performances that blend music with a vibrant array of art forms, commissioning and creating new works as well as celebrating and reframing old ones.
